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Risks and Benefits of

Total Hip Arthroplasty

Today, you and Dr. Bohnenkamp discussed the possibility of having a total hip replacement (arthroplasty). This is a surgical procedure, and there are risks and complications associated with any surgical procedure.

Possible Complications of a Total Hip Replacement (arthroplasty)

| Arthrofibrosis (joint stiffness) |

| Heterotopic ossification (abnormal bone formation) |

| Post-op tendonitis/bursitis or weakness |

Persistent pain and dissatisfaction (especially if history of chronic pain, depression, fibromyalgia, or other chronic pain conditions)

Mobility dysfunction

Failure and limitation of the procedure, which could lead to future surgeries

Unsightly scarring and pain

Inability to lie on the operative side

Iatrogenic (during surgery) or later presenting fracture

Loosening and any type of dislocation, which can become recurrent

Possible Complications of Surgery

| Complications with anesthesia | Decubiti (pressure sores) |

| Heart attack | Post-op pneumonia |
| Cardiac arrest | Atelectasis (fluid in the lungs) |
| Blood clot in the leg or lung | Skin infection |
| Stroke | Urinary tract infection |
| Post-op ileus or bowel obstruction | Neurovascular injury of the operative and non-operative limbs |
| Delirium and confusion | |
| Excess bleeding requiring blood transfusions | Amputation |
| | Deep infection |
| Problems associated with prolonged positioning under anesthesia | Wound healing complications, especially if you smoke |
| Complications due to anesthesia | Death |

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Having a history of back pain issues could potentially flare up back pain after a hip replacement. If the pain is coming from the back, a hip replacement is unlikely to alleviate all of the discomfort.

Hip Stability

Hip stability is of utmost importance in the procedure. A hip replacement may lengthen or shorten the operative side. This is typically something that goes unnoticed. If your leg feels longer or shorter after the procedure, this is something that can normalize over time, and in the end you may require a heel lift if it does not.

You're in Good Hands
